Across cultures, we are reminded: no matter how carefully we chart our lives, the world may still surprise us in ways good and terrible. We have long known antisemitism persists—but few could have foreseen its resurgence across campuses, cities, and even close-knit communities. We could not have imagined that nearly two years after October 7, 58 hostages would remain in Gaza. Or that wildfires would consume parts of our city and displace so many.

The future is unknowable. But our response is not fear—it is faith. It is community. It is resolve.

That's why, over the past year, our Board of Directors, clergy, and staff created a bold five-year strategic plan for Stephen Wise Temple. More than a vision, it's a roadmap for building a resilient, inclusive, and spiritually vibrant community—ready for what's now, and what's next. We are excited to share it with you over the months to come, and build it together over the next years.

A Shelter and a Sanctuary

A popular Israeli song reminds us: "Am hanetzach l'olam lo mefached עם הנצח לעולם לא מפחד"—The Eternal People is not afraid. To be part of the Jewish people—and of this community—is to anchor yourself in uncertain times. This mountaintop is both a mikdash מקדש—a sacred space—and a miklat מקלט—a refuge.

Inside these pages, you'll hear from students, parents, teens, and adults who found purpose and belonging at Wise. Teenagers moved by Jewish values to respond to the fires. Children who found their voice on the bimah. Adults exploring new ideas and ancient wisdom.

A note from our Executive Director. **Jodi Berman:**

Their initiative, Sole Support, collected hundreds of donated shoes, bringing comfort and relief to those in need. "Early childhood education is the foundation of a child's lifelong journey of learning and discovery. The Aaron Milken Center embodies our commitment to providing



OPERATING REVENUE SOURCES




